## Miscellaneous Classes For Adults

### **Cub Scout STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics)**

STEM is a hot topic these days for both schools and the BSA. Come learn why STEM is important, how to integrate STEM into your den and pack program, and participate in some fun projects that you can take back to your unit.

### **STEM Scouts Leaders** (4 period course)

The STEM Leader Training course provides new STEM Scouts leaders with the basic information needed to conduct a successful Lab Meeting. STEM Scouts is a coed program of the Boy Scouts of America using methods such as the Scout Oath and Scout Law, setting and achieving goals, uniforms, leadership skills, and adult role models. STEM Scouts is designed to teach young people science, technology, engineering, and mathematics as they develop leadership skills and expand those skills into future careers by giving them the opportunity to work in teams, challenging themselves, and connect with STEM professionals. STEM Scouts is a yearlong program coinciding with the academic school year.

### **The New Venturing Program**

The Venturing awards and recognitions programs are designed to help Venturers grow in the areas of adventure, leadership, personal development and service. Awards serve as benchmarks that give Venturers a structure for developing their own personal vision into manageable goals that lead to recognition by their peers, mentors and the larger community. ### **BALOO Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation** Cost of BALOO is \$20 and will be reflected that on your receipt.

A one day training event that introduces Cub Scout leaders and parents to the skills needed to plan and conduct pack outdoor activities, particularly pack camping.

### **Youth Protection Training**

Youth Protection Training is required for all BSA registered volunteers. Get the latest training TODAY! The Boy Scouts of America takes great pride in the quality of our adult leadership. Youth Protection Training must be completed by each Scouter every two years.

### **Cub Scout Awards - Where Do They Go?**

My son has earned all of this bling. Where does it go on his uniform? Come find out and learn from other Cub Scout leaders.

### **Webelos to Scout Transition**

Discover ways to make the move for new Boy Scouts natural and fun. The passage from Cub Scout pack to Boy Scout troop should be smooth, with no time lost in between. By the time Webelos Scouts are ready to cross over, they and their families should be familiar and comfortable with the youth and adult leaders of the troop, their role in the troop, troop activities, and feel excited about beginning this new adventure.

### **Webelos Den Success**

## **Boy Scouting Classes For Adults**

### **BSA Outdoor Ethics-Program and Awards**

BSA's Outdoor Ethics uses the seven principles of Leave No Trace and the five principles of Tread Lightly to support the Outdoor Code by providing Scouting members with a principled framework for assisting them in arriving at proper ethical decisions while recreating outdoors.

### **Essentials of Merit Badge Counselor Training (2 period class)**

This merit badge counselor orientation presentation provides new and prospective merit badge counselors with the basic knowledge and skills needed to get started, and can serve as a refresher to veterans. It involves a step-by-step overview of the registration and approval process, speaks to the requirement for Youth Protection Training, and discusses helpful methods and resources. Participants will learn about their unique role, the process of counseling, and the related BSA national policies and procedures.

### **Scoutmaster Minutes**

Discuss the importance of Scoutmaster Minutes, sources for topics, plus how to present a Scoutmaster Minute at troop meetings, campouts and other special occasions.

### **Boards of Review: Non-Eagle**

A Board of Review is the final step for Scout advancement at each rank. Are your Boards of Review effective? Do they motivate your Scouts? Are you comfortable sitting on a Board of Review? What questions should or should not be asked at a Board of Review?

### **Basic Map and Compass**

This course teaches and identifies resources available to teach map and compass skills through 2nd Class including: reading and orienting topo maps, taking bearing and planning a hike.

### **Troop Equipment and Gadgets**

Discuss equipment, how it can be built and modified to best meet the needs of your troop.

### **Planning Boy Scout Outings and Campouts**

Learn how to teach the boys to plan and organize their outings and camp outs in a Patrol Leader council environment and at the troop level.

### **Scouting's Honor Society: the Order of the Arrow**

1001 Things you don't know about the order of the arrow (OA) and 3 you do. Learn how to use the OA to retain Scouts longer and how the OA can help your troop, neighboring Cub Scout packs and your community.

## **Scoutmaster Leadership and Coaching**

A review of the proper role of a Scoutmaster; how to encourage and manage an effective Scout run program; and build relationships with key youth leaders.

## **How to Be an Effective Eagle Scout Advisor**

In this course we will be discussing the National Guidelines of how to help an Eagle Scout candidate to Eagle, dispelling myths, how to help the Eagle Scout candidate set up his initial through final write up, and providing information on what to do to help your Scout complete his trail to Eagle.

## **Improving Youth Leadership in a Boy Led Troop**

Methods for Scouters to successfully introduce and implement BSA youth leadership responsibilities and duties to newly elected youth leaders for their growth in leadership roles. A review of the Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST) course.

## **Patrol Challenge Events**

Add interesting learning opportunities and healthy competition to your troop meetings by giving your Scouts a chance to compete in Patrol Challenges. Challenges can cover knots, lashings, first aid, wilderness knowledge and other Scouting skills. Discussion includes ideas, topics and rewards, and how to introduce Patrol Challenges to your troop. Participants get a list of ideas and practical hands-on experience with a select sample of Challenges.

## **Land Navigation (2 period course)**

Learn skills needed to complete both First Class and Orienteering merit badge requirements. Be prepared to walk and learn.

Discuss equipment, how it can be built and modified to best meet the needs of your troop.

## **Hiking and Backpacking Needs and Skills for Boy Scouts**

How to safely and successfully take a hike or a backpacking trip. Learn about the "10 Essentials", safety and time considerations and how to create fun along the way.

## **Leave No Trace for Boy Scouts - The Basics**

Understand the principles of Leave No Trace and the Boy Scout Outdoor Code, how to teach these and why outdoor ethics are needed.

### **Chartered Organization Representative Conference (This course will also be held for the members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.)**

## **First Aid Classes For Adults**

These classes are approved by the Colorado Department of Human Services and Front Range CPR instructors are approved vendors. These classes fulfill all requirements for those certified as foster parents, group homes, child cares, day cares and elder care facilities.

### **Basic First Aid Certification**

**There is an additional \$25 charge due to instructor at the beginning of this class.**

In this class you will learn the importance of proper patient assessment. Then after a thorough evaluation of the patient you will learn skills such as, bleeding control, immobilization of fractures, strains and sprains, burn care, asthma, diabetics, seizures, anaphylactic shock and much more.

### **Basic CPR for Adult, Child and Infant/AED**

The skills in the class include, opening airway, rescue breathing, choking for the conscious and unconscious victim and CPR.

### **Wilderness First Aid Recertification**

**There is an additional \$45 charge due to instructor at the beginning of this class.**

This 4 hour recertification course is only for those who have previously completed the 16 hour WFA Certification course and need to update their certification in Wilderness First Aid.

## **Cooking Classes For Adults**

### **Cooking for Special Dietary Needs**

Special dietary needs is a growing issue facing units in Scouting. Whether those needs are religious, personal preference, or medical necessity, they are becoming more common and challenging when we plan events involving food. Cooking for special dietary needs is an approach to planning and cooking that accounts for the dietary needs while also promoting Scouting values and inclusiveness. This session will give you the tools to implement with your unit.

### **Outdoor Cooking Basics**

The world of outdoor cooking using foil techniques.

### **Outdoor Cook Advanced**

Enhance your cooking skills and cook your own lunch using foil or a Dutch oven.

### **Dutch Oven Cooking**

Learn the "how to and know not to" of Dutch oven cooking. Basic safety, sanitation and cooking skills are demonstrated.

### **Camping Food Safety and Sanitation**

The discussion topics include: safe food handling, hand sanitation, proper dish washing, sanitizing and storage, "animal proofing" your camp kitchen, wastewater issues, trash and garbage disposal and latrine placement.

## Planning Camping Meals

Learn how to use basic nutrition facts and available tools (like Nutritional Facts Panels) to teach Scouts how to plan healthy, balanced meals for camping trips and organize a "Food Education" program for your unit.

## **Boy Scout Youth Training**

### Den Chief Conference - Training for Den Chiefs

An all-day training session for Boy and Venturing Scouts who act as Den Chiefs for Webelos and Cub Scout dens.

### Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST)

This class is aimed at youth leadership in the troop presenting methods for Scouts to implement leadership training and development, and give tips on how to promote and run a youth run unit. Scouts planning on attending Big Horn/NYLT training need to complete this course.

## **Commissioner Classes**

### District Commissioner/Assistant District Commissioner Basic Training

District and Assistant District Commissioner Basic Training contains your orientation to being an effective Administrative Commissioner. From recruiting Unit Commissioners to Counseling Unit leaders and Commissioners in the most challenging of situation, to using the Online Commissioner Administration system, your time will be well spent.

### ComBaT - Commissioner Basic Training

Do you enjoy helping the Scouting Program? Do you drink water? Do you breathe air? If you can answer yes to these 3 basic questions, then you probably qualify as someone who could be a valuable contributor to the Scouting Program in terms of being a Unit Commissioner. This class tells you what being a Commissioner is all about and provides you with the Basics for being a Unit Commissioner.

### Commissioner Tools

An introduction to the new Commissioner Tools on My.Scouting.Org. We'll cover the basics of accessing the system, entering Unit Contacts and using some of the many tools that are available to Commissioners.

### Commissioner Journey to Excellence (JTE)

JTE evaluation assists the leaders in guiding the program to success. Journey to Excellence is an evaluation tool designed to be used throughout the Scouting year. It measures key points in a Scouting unit that are indicators of successful Scouting. Learn the easy and correct use of this tool for the sake of your Scouts and volunteers from an experienced District Commissioner.

## **Special Needs Training For Adults**

### **Generations in Scouting**

Different generations have different values experiences, learning methods, attitudes, behaviors and motivations. This interactive course will help you understand the differences, recognize the strength each generation brings, and find a shared vision to work together.

### **Diversity Awareness**

Living in a rapidly changing world presents Scouts and Scouters with ethical and social challenges dealing with individuals from different ethnic and social groups. Learn how to teach Scouts and Scouters the necessary skills to deal with our diverse world.

### **Special Needs Registration and Advancement Procedures**

For registered leaders and parents, learn how to register a Scout with a disability as a Scout with special needs for all levels of Scouting. Learn how to apply for modified and/or alternative advancement procedures using the BSA Individual Scout Achievement Plan for Boy Scouts, Venture Scouts, or Varsity Scout with special needs. Learn how to register for beyond the age of eligibility for a Boy Scout, Venture Scout or a Varsity Scout with developmental disabilities or severe physical limitations. Handouts and check lists provided.

### **Solving Behavioral Issues**

We know your unit does not have any behavioral issues but here's an opportunity to learn how other units deal with behavioral challenges involving Scouts and Scouters.

### **Bullying and Hazing Prevention**

An informative session on Bullying and hazing identification and prevention. This is becoming a larger problem in society and we need ways to recognize and respond. It happens in Scouting and tears units apart. So attend and get ideas, suggestions and thoughts on how to recognize and respond to this important issue.

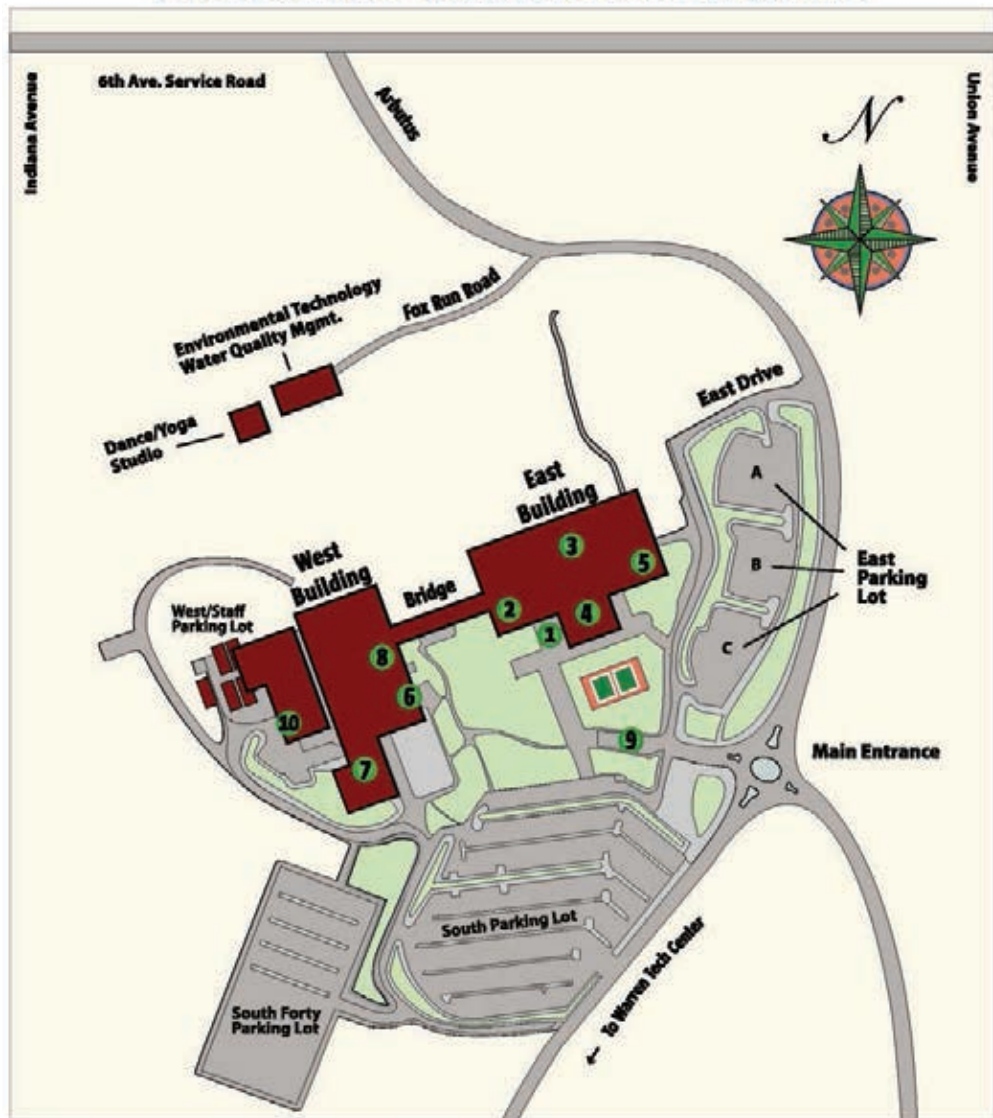
### **Emotional Fitness for Teens**

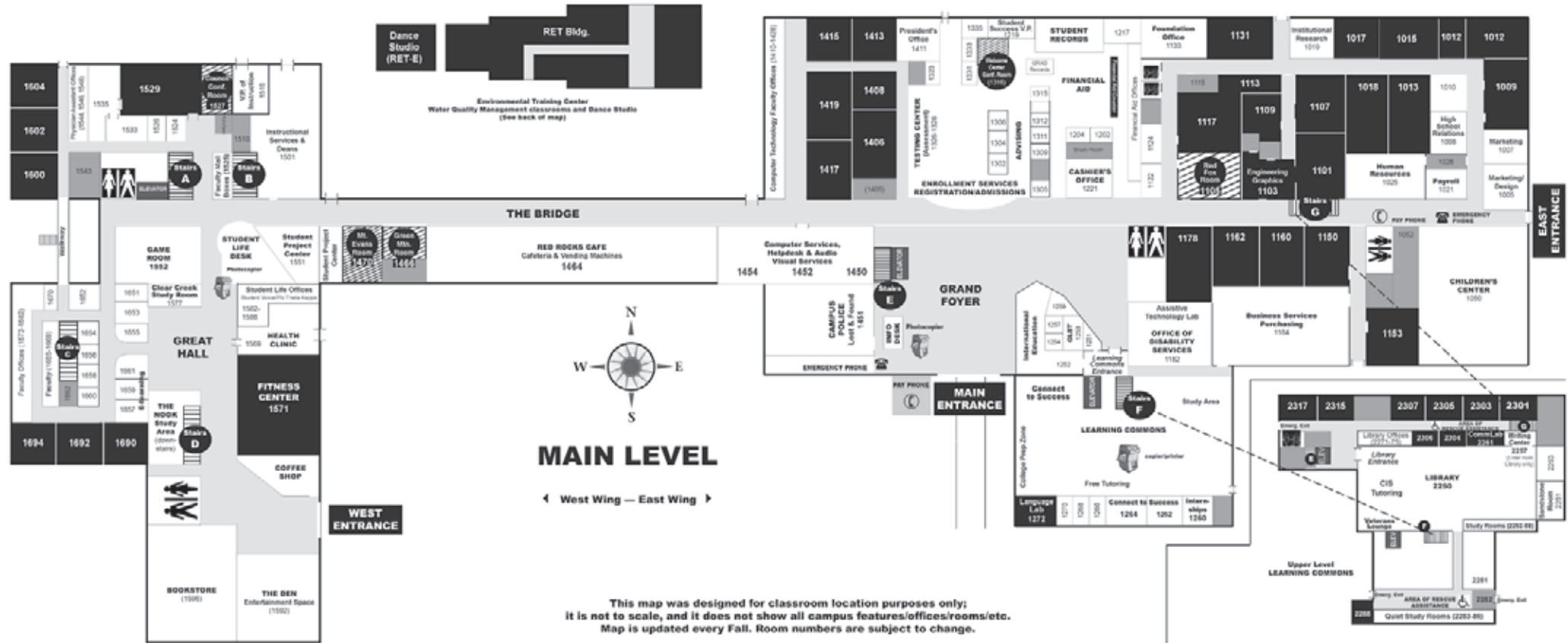

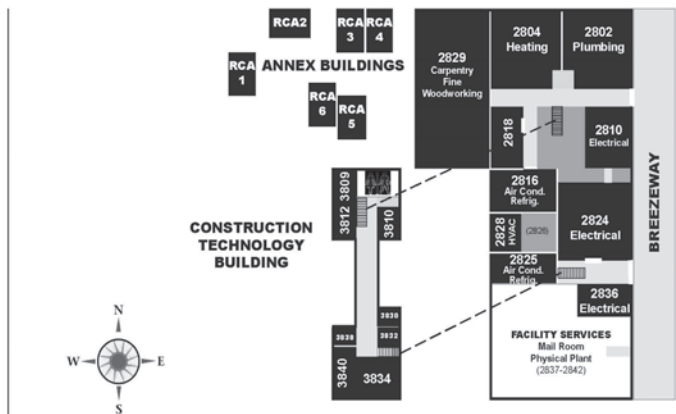
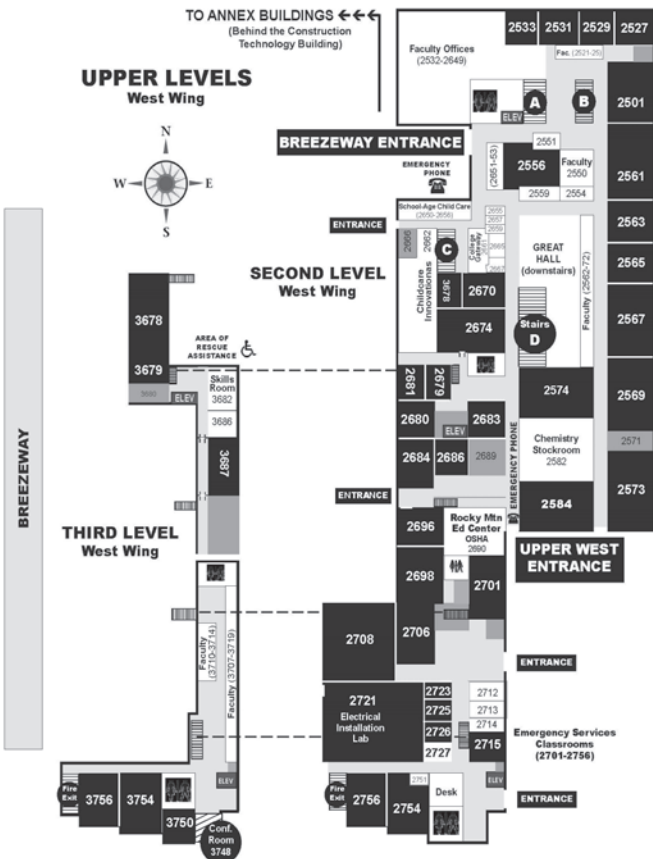
