
About Peaceful Valley Scout

Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch

Located in central Colorado, 65 miles southeast of Denver, a few miles south of the town of Elbert. The Ranch consists of 3,316 acres of mountain park terrain at 7,000 feet in elevation along the Palmer Divide in the Black Forest. Peaceful Valley also functions as a working ranch throughout the year, with over 1,000 acres devoted to farming and grazing. There are three different Scout camps located on Peaceful Valley, with a description of each located below.

C a m p Cris Dobbins

Nestled in the middle of the Black Forest, Camp Cris Dobbins offers sweeping views of Pikes Peak and the front range of the Rocky Mountains. Scouts will have a tough time choosing between the more than 50 merit badges offered here, and will love spending time on the water slides at the outdoor pool, dusting a clay at the Olympic shotgun range, channeling their inner movie star in our Moviemaking program, or pretending to be Indiana Jones at our STEM lodge archaeology dig site. The convenience of meals from our dining hall and sleeping on raised wooden platforms in canvas wall tents will allow Scouts to focus on the only thing that matters: their next outdoor adventure!





Camp Cortlandt Dietler

As the sun rises and the world slowly starts to come to life, the sound of sizzling bacon on a camp stove can be heard throughout Camp Cortlandt Dietler as cooks from various patrols prepare breakfast. •	Slight right to stay on Founders Pkwy	3.6 miles
•	Turn left onto CO-86	20.6 miles
•	Turn right onto N Elbert Rd	10.2 miles

• Continue through the town of Elbert

• Turn into Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch (at the second entrance), Dobbins, Dietler, and WEST will be on the left. Magness will be on the right.

• Take E Platte Ave east until it turns in CO-24

• Follow CO-24 to Elbert Rd, take a left

• Turn right on to Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch at the first entrance for Dobbins, Dietler, or WEST. Turn left for Magness.

All Scouts and leaders attending Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch need to be prepared! Scouts and leaders must bring a daypack that is large enough to carry the "10 Essentials" while in camp. The "10 Essentials" should be carried always since you never know when the weather may change.

If the BSA facility is placed in pre-evacuation area for fire, flood or other causes, all Scouts and leaders will be required to have their "10 Essentials" especially at these times. During an evacuation, this daypack may be the only item you can take.

In addition, adult leaders should also have in their daypack; their wallet, identification, cell phone/charger, car keys, and their personal medications. The Unit Scoutmaster should also include a unit roster in their daypack. It is the responsibility of the troop adult leaders to ensure that everyone in their unit have the necessary equipment with them.

Pre-Camp Leader Orientation Meeting

There will be a Leader's Orientation Meeting held on Saturday, April 28, 2018 during Scout Show. Time will be announced later, watch the Scout Show fliers. **Attendance by a unit representative is very important.** The camp management will go over any questions that leaders have regarding summer camp. If your unit is unable attend, please feel free to contact Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch at <u>PeacefulValley@scouting.org</u>.

Camp Accommodations

Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch is a primitive camp. Units tent camp together in assigned campsites. Camp Dietler does not provide tents, while Camp Cris Dobbins does. If you wish to rent a tent at Camp Dietler, there is a \$20 charge for each tent. Tent reservations must be made at least two weeks prior to your camp, via email at PeacefulValley@scouting.org. There are latrines and showers at all campsites. The shower house located near St. Joe's Tent City and located in the Gilwell Hall are FOR ADULTS ONLY.

Our Dining Hall provides breakfast, lunch, and dinner for Camp Cris Dobbins participants.

Units at Camp Dietler will cook at their site, with gear provided by camp.

There is a trading post with a variety of Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch branded items, as well as camping and trekking gear. Daily hours will be posted at camp.

Campers with Special Needs

If a Scout or adult in your unit needs some extra help to enjoy their camp experience, please let us know! We have a few campsites that are easier for those with mobility problems. We can also arrange for access to "indoor plumbing," or wheelchair-accessible portable toilets, when needed. If your Scout will need some extra attention from our counselors, we can help!

If you have such a situation, please contact the Camp Director at PeacefulValley@scouting.org no later than two weeks before your week of camp. A member of camp management will confirm the arrangements with you.

Campers with Special Diets

Our kitchen staff is willing to accommodate special diets for campers, whether for religious, medical, or philosophical reasons.

If a camper has a dietary restriction, make sure it is indicated on their medical form. In addition, please fill out the Special Diet Request Form found on the Council website, www.bsacoloradoadventure.org, in the Camp Library Section, a minimum of two weeks in advance to request special dietary needs. A member

of camp management will confirm the arrangements with you. If this form is not received by then, there is no guarantee that the kitchen will be able to accommodate the dietary needs.

On arrival, check with the camp staff, as well as the food service personnel, and they will instruct you on how to get your special meals.

Internet / Cell Service at Camp

Internet is limited at Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch. Cell service is available on most parts of camp at Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch, no matter your carrier, however coverage can be limited. Please do not rely on your personal cell phones during your stay. Data service is poor for all providers.

Guest Policy

Please make sure staff is aware of guests who are planning to visit during the week. Guest visits are encouraged, but staff will need to plan for their arrival. Additional fees apply for those guests who stay for meals: Breakfast \$6.00, Lunch \$7.00 and Dinner \$8.00. Guests who are not registered ahead of time will have to eat last at each meal service. All guests staying on camp property overnight must provide Parts A, B, & C Health Forms, which does require a physician's signature. Please bring these forms when you check in at the office. Day visitors - a person who is on property from the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., this person does not need a Health Form but must be off property by 9:00 p.m.

Lost and Found

If a Scout loses something while he is at camp this summer, check at camp headquarters on Friday night before leaving. If a valuable item such as a watch or wallet is discovered missing after you get home, call the Peaceful Valley Headquarters at 303-648-3023 to see if it has been turned in. Lost and found must be claimed at Peaceful Valley. All unclaimed items are donated to charity after September 1st. **Have your Scout's clothing and equipment items marked with his name and troop number**. Be sure you have everything before you leave camp!

Road Safety

Safety of all guests at Peaceful Valley is our top priority. Please reference the following policies for information regarding driving on camp property.

While walking on the camp roads, please also be aware of vehicles that may need to drive by. It is suggested that participants walk on the righthand side of the road. If a vehicle needs to pass a group, the whole group should move to the same side of the road.

All pedestrians must move out of the way for medical vehicles. Any person who knowingly delays a medical vehicle when they are responding to call will be sent home.

Vehicle Policy

During check-in or checkout, one vehicle per unit will be allowed to drive on the service roads to the campsite to drop a trailer or any oversized gear. All vehicles are to be returned to the parking lot. Absolutely no non-camp vehicles are allowed to drive into the campsites or off the main roads at any time.

If a Scout or adult leader has special mobility needs, a permit can be obtained from the camp medic to drive the individual around camp. In order to receive a permit, you must have a state issued handicap placard or a doctor's note, NO EXCEPTIONS! The driving rules are below, and any violation of these may result in your permit being revoked and may result in fines to your unit.

- Vehicles must stay on roadways and MAY NOT be driven directly into the campsite.
- Each occupant of a vehicle should have a proper seat and use a seat belt.
- Drivers of vehicles must be at least 18 years of age, with a current driver's license.
- Follow the posted speed limits. At all times, use caution for the safety of campers.
- Scouts and leaders are prohibited from riding in the back of pickup trucks or trailers, riding on bumpers, tope of vehicles, etc.

Vehicles that have received a permit for a mobility need should only be used for the persons with that need (and a buddy if necessary for YPT compliance). It is not appropriate for unit leaders to provide a shuttle service for your Scouts at camp. Remember, a Scout is physically fit, and driving Scouts around encourages others to do the same which adds unnecessary traffic and risk.

No vehicles (excluding permitted and camp vehicles) are allowed on the service road outside of checkin and checkout times. This policy also pertains to adults rotating throughout the week. Please be aware that adults will not be allowed to drive up to their campsite if they are rotating during the week. Anyone checking in late or checking out early must hike their gear between their car and campsite, so please pack accordingly.

Campers and motor homes may be permitted to stay at camp only in select areas at Peaceful Valley. The main area is Winchester Flats at Camp Dobbins. In select cases, a camper may be allowed in the lower Dietler lot or one of the Magness shelter lots. However, management reserves the right to deny use of these lots at any point. There are no hookups or dumping stations. We strongly encourage only participants and visitors with extreme needs to utilize this option. Please contact the Camp Director, Will Corcoran at will.corcoran@scouting.org before you arrive at camp.

Scouts and adults are prohibited from riding in the bed of pickup trucks or on/in trailers. Each occupant of a vehicle must have a proper seat and use a seatbelt.

Roads are some of our main trails at camp, and increased traffic adds unnecessary danger to our campers. Excessive use is eroding our camp roads. Please help us keep camp safe and beautiful and abide by this policy. Failure to adhere to this policy may result in fines to your troop, with extreme cases resulting in persons possibly being asked to leave.

CAMP FEES

Scout Fee

In 2018, the fee for a Scout to attend Camp Dietler is \$335.00, Camp Cris Dobbins is \$385.00.

Camp Payment Schedule

- Camp Reservation Fee: November 6, 2017 \$50.00 (non-refundable) deposit per camper for the number of Scouts listed.
- **First Payment: February 5, 2018 -** additional payment of \$100.00 per camper for the registered number of Scouts is due.
- **Second Payment: April 2, 2018 -** additional payment of \$100.00 per camper for registered number of Scouts is due.
- Final Payment: May 7, 2018 the outstanding balance camper and adult is due.

Adult Leader Fee

The Denver Area Council will cover the fees for two adult leaders. Each troop is required to have a <u>minimum</u> <u>of two adult leaders</u> in camp at all times, no matter the troop size! Additionally, each unit is required to have <u>one adult leader per every 10 Scouts</u>. While adult leaders may rotate throughout the week, the minimum leadership of two adults must be present always. The fee schedule for **adults** is as follows:

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1-20 Scouts - 2 free adults and 1 additional adults - $200.00  
21-30 Scouts - 2 free adults and 1 additional adult - $75.00; any additional adults - $200.00  
31-40 Scouts - 2 free adults and 2 additional adults - $75.00; any additional adults - $200.00  
41-50 Scouts - 2 free adults and 3 additional adults - $75.00; any additional adults - $200.00  
51-60 Scouts - 2 free adults and 4 additional adults - $75.00; any additional adults - $200.00  
61-70 Scouts - 2 free adults and 5 additional adults - $75.00; any additional adults - $200.00
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Visitor Individual Meal Fees

Breakfast: \$6 **Lunch:** \$7 **Dinner:** \$8 This must be paid upon visitor check-in

Reservations

Reservations for camp can be made online at the Council website, BSAColoradoAdventure.org.

Camperships

Requests for camperships (scholarships to attend camp) must be in writing to the Council Camping Committee detailing why a Scout needs financial assistance. You may request a campership application from the Frederic C. Hamilton Scout Headquarters, or, find it on the Council website, BSAColoradoAdventure.org. All requests should be turned in prior to **April 1, 2018**. A Scout may not receive or apply for a campership after attending summer camp. Only Denver Area Council Scouts are eligible for camperships.

Refunds Prior to Camp

A \$50 per Scout deposit is non-refundable, but may be transferred to another Scout as long as the unit's total number does not decrease.

If a cancellation is made prior to May 16th, the cancelling participant will receive a full refund, less the \$50. Participants who cancel after May 16th WILL NOT receive a refund. However, if a physician provides a letter stating the reason the participant cannot attend is medical, or the unit leader provides a note stating that

there was a death in the immediate family, the participants will receive a full refund, less the \$50 non-refundable deposit.

Refunds While Attending Camp

If a Scout or participant becomes ill or has an injury while attending camp and is sent home prior to Wednesday by order of the camp Medical Director, the Scout will be entitled to a 50% refund. If a Scout or participant goes home after Wednesday, they **WILL NOT** receive a refund. Scouts or participants who leave camp for behavioral issues, by their own choice, or for any other reason, **WILL NOT** be granted a refund.

The unit's Scoutmaster or Committee Chairperson should make a refund request in writing to the Camping Department. A "Refund Request Form" is available on the Council website, <u>BSAColoradoAdventure.org</u>. **DURING CAMP, THERE WILL BE NO REFUNDS ISSUED!** All refunds go through the Council Office upon approval, a check will be issued. Refund requests need to be made no later than August 31, 2018.

Merit Badge Registration Dates

Dates for online merit badge registration are staggered and determined by camp attendance weeks. Merit badge signup begins at 8:00 a.m. MST on all dates. Also, please note that some classes have maximum caps, and signup for these classes will be on a first come, first served basis. Information on merit badges will be online towards the end of March. Please look for the Camp Dietler or Camp Cris Dobbins Program and Troop Guide

Week 1: June 10-16	Monday, April 2
Week 2: June 17-23	Monday, April 9
Week 3: June 24-30	Monday, April 16
Week 4: July 1-7	Monday, April 23
Week 5: July 8-14	Monday, April 30
Week 6: July 15-21	Monday, May 7

While there is a chance to sign up for or switch classes when you arrive at camp, some classes may be filled and unavailable. We suggest Scouts pick their classes before registration opens, and then the troop completes registration as soon as possible when it opens.

Merit Badge Fees

Some classes offered at Peaceful Valley require more resources than others and not all Scouts get to experience them. Due to this, some classes have a fee or kit purchase required. All class fees are paid at camp and kits must be purchased at camp. Units may pay for all fees and kits with one payment, or may require each individual Scout to pay for their own. This is the discretion of the unit leader. Please make sure your unit is prepared for these fees.

Scouts will not be able to finish all requirements without paying these fees. Specific fees will be noted in the camp Program Guides.

Online Registration

Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch uses an online registration system through a partnership with the Doubleknot Company for entering rosters, unit information, and pre-camp signup for all merit badge classes and various program activities. Make sure that you complete the entire sign up procedure. Keep the "User ID" and "Password" for registration – you will need this information to register your Scouts for their merit badges, and make your payments. If your unit does not have internet access, you will be able to process rosters and class registration by mail.

Step-by-Step Registration Guide

As you register for merit badges, please keep in mind that even if no payment is due, your merit badge registration, INCLUDING ALL CHANGES AND UPDATES, will not be saved until you have completed the registration process by clicking the "Continue" button. If you feel you have already made the appropriate payments, you still need to select "Pay by Mail" to complete the process and save any changes.

Registration instructions are as follows: (Very detailed)

- Go to <u>BSAColoradoAdventure.org</u>. Then click on Login. Enter your login information.
- Under Summary.
- See Upcoming Payments. Under Registration and Reservations, click on **View Details**. This will show the unit's information.
- Under Registration
- Click on **Update/Edit**. This is the screen where you can make changes, sign up for merit badges, etc.
- Click on Who's Coming. You must register everyone before signing up for merit badges.
- Type in first name, last name and phone number.
- Follow procedure for each Scout and adult. After you have added all your Scouts and adults, click continue. This procedure must be completed before Scouts can be signed up for merit badges.
- Click on What Are They Doing.
- Next to the Choose Activities, in drop box, click on the name of the Scout you wish to register.
- Next click on **Select a Category**, and select his merit badges. After you select the first Scout's classes, click on the next Scout, and select his classes. Follow this same procedure for each Scout. After you complete the classes for your Scouts, click on **Continue**. You can print a copy of the troop's merit badge classes here, but please note classes are not saved until you click on **Check Out**.
- Click on Check Out.
- A screen with **Payment & Billing Payment** will appear, and if you are not making a credit card payment, click the **Offline/Mail (mailbox)** button.
- Then click on Complete Order.
- Next screen registration, click **Done**.
- The final screen, Payment Details Registration, click Done.

If all the procedures are followed, all your changes will be saved. **Remember, each time you make any additional changes; you must complete the entire procedure.** If you need any additional information, or have any concerns, please feel free to contact our Outdoor Adventure Registrar, Mary Ann Romero, at 720.266.2111 or maryann.romero@scouting.org. There will be an opportunity at camp to make schedule changes, but we highly recommend you try and finalize your Scout's schedules before you arrive, as space fills up quickly.

What to Pack?

This list is only what we suggest you pack for camp. Which program you and your Scouts are participating in, or personal preference, may require you to pack differently. When packing, think of what you need every day, and always remember: **Be Prepared**.

- · Sleeping Bag
- Small mattress, cot or pad (mattresses are not provided)
- Small pillow (optional)
- Sleep clothing
- Good walking shoes or hiking boots (please break in before summer camp)
- Sneakers (for backup and games)
- 3-8 pair socks Preferably wool, easier to dry and keep feet warm when wet.
- 3-8 changes of underwear
- 2 pair of shorts nylon works very well
- 2-3 T-shirts
- 1 hat (broad-brim is best)
- Scout Uniform
- Belt
- Swimsuit
- Long sleeve shirt(s)
- Long pants
- Fleece or sweater Avoid cotton sweatshirts, as they are useless when wet.
- Outer jacket
- Rain gear Needs to cover the whole body. Poncho alone is inadequate. Rain jacket/pants are best.
- Long underwear optional for those who get cold easily
- Stocking cap or beanie optional
- Daypack big enough to carry rain gear, water bottle, class materials
- Tarp (required for any outpost programs)
- Water bottle 1 quart
- Toilet kit toothbrush, toothpaste, comb, shampoo, soap, washcloth, lip balm
- Sunscreen
- Personal first aid kit see Handbook
- Towel(s)
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Alarm Clock and/or wristwatch
- Notebook and pencils/pens
- Merit badge books, Scout Handbook
- Work done at home for merit badges, and/or things needed for merit badges
- Medical Form (completely filled out and signed before camp)
- Medications in original container
- Eyeglasses and/or sunglasses
- Small camera-optional
- Swim goggles-optional
- Pocketknife small optional, must have Totin' Chip.
- Compass optional
- Whistle- optional by troop
- · Spending money, money for class/fees, in a wallet with your name

Ten Essentials of Scouting

- Rain Gear (should provide adequate coverage)
- Water bottle
- First-Aid Kit
- Sun Protection
- Flashlight
- Trail Food
- Extra Clothing
- Map and Compass
- Pocketknife (need Totin' Chip)
- Matches and Fire Starter (for emergencies only, no open fires allowed at PV)



What not to Pack

We want every participant who comes to Peaceful Valley to Be Prepared, but there are plenty of items that you should not bring to camp. There are also many items that are prohibited at camp, doing so will result in confiscation or even the participant being asked to leave ranch. We suggest you do not bring the following items:

- · Gaming consoles of any kind
- Laptops or Tablets
- Excessive amounts of money
- Expensive electronics
- Irreplaceable items (books, jewelry, grandfather's pocket knife, etc.)

While we do not prohibit you from bringing these items to camp, we are not responsible if any of these items are lost or broken. Please refrain from bringing any items to camp that may fall into these categories.

Cell phone use by Scouts is not allowed in program areas. Troops are encouraged to set their own guidelines for campsite and travel use of electronics. If the troop allows Scouts to bring their cellphones, they must remain put away during classes and program. We do suggest keeping them either locked in the troop trailer or in the Scout's possession. Best practice is to keep it in a zip lock bag or other waterproof container.

The following items are NOT allowed at camp. Any person who brings them will have the items confiscated, may be asked to leave, or even have the Elbert Sheriff called. Do not bring any of the following:

- · Guns or ammunition of any kind
- Knifes larger than 3.5"
- Any other form of weaponry
- Fireworks or explosives
- Alcohol
- Drugs or drug paraphernalia
- Clothing or items with inappropriate language or graphics
- Any items that go against the BSA policy, or do not follow the Scout Oath and Law

Suggested Uniforms while at Camp

The official BSA field uniform is always appropriate dress at Peaceful Valley. Every camper is expected to wear the field uniform (often referred to as the "Class A" uniform) at evening flags, dinner or while performing a flag ceremony. Scouts at Dobbins are encouraged to wear it while attending chapel as well. The activity uniform (often called the "Class B" uniform), substituting a Scout t-shirt for the uniform shirt, is encouraged at all other times.

Campers should wear sturdy walking or hiking shoes with socks. Lighter shoes may be worn in the campsite. Sandals or shoes without toes are unsafe and not permitted. Inappropriate clothing includes sleeveless undershirts or clothing with foul or suggestive language or graphics.

Demonstrate your unit's Scouting Spirit by being the best-uniformed unit in camp!

Campsite & Provided Equipment

While every effort will be made to place your troop in their desired campsite, sometimes this is not always possible, and the Camp Director reserves the right to shift troops around as needed to accommodate campsite capacities. At Dobbins and Dietler, your troop might also share a campsite with another troop, depending on each troop's total number of participants.

Each campsite is equipped with a pit latrine with hot showers, and will be stocked with a broom, hose, toilet brush, and other cleaning supplies. There will also be a hand washing station, roll of paper towels, and a soap dispenser in each latrine. We encourage all troops to use their own latrines when it comes to showering, and to have their Scouts and adult leaders ask for permission from other troops if they need to use another campsite's latrine. Adult leaders may also shower in Gilwell Hall and shower house. Scouts can wear their swimsuits and use the showers on the deck of the pool.

There is a flagpole in some campsites, and troops are highly encouraged to bring their troop and patrol flags to hang their flags. Units are also encouraged to pioneer a flagpole.

At Camp Dobbins you will be provided with one tent and platform for every two Scouts/adult leaders, as well as at least one dining fly and one picnic table per troop. Cots and mattresses are not provided, and Scouts and adult leaders are encouraged to bring their own. Please note that adult leaders do not get their own tents, and are encouraged to bring their own tents if possible. These can be pitched in specific areas at the troop's campsite, and your Campsite or Patrol Host can point these areas out upon check-in.

At Camp Dietler, troops will only be provided tents if they are renting them. Rental tents are 4 person Coleman Sundomes. Cots and mattresses are not provided. There will be patrol boxes, wash buckets, a picnic table, and a dining fly provided for each patrol.

Sunday Check-In Procedures

Check-in is Sunday afternoon between 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. for all Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch programs. All troop members and their vehicles must park in the camp's designated parking lot. The troop will be met by their camp host who will greet and meet the troop. The Unit Scoutmaster and Senior Patrol Leader will check in with Camp staff at the respective location, to receive their campsite assignment, review registration paperwork, turn in swim check form, troop roster and adult roster. The rest of the troop will be taken on a camp tour by their Camp Host, for medical check-in, swim checks if needed. Once med-checks / swim checks have been completed, the troop may move into their campsite. The only vehicle allowed to drive to the campsite to unload is the troop trailer and the vehicle pulling the trailer. The troop trailer may remain at the campsite during

your week at camp, but the vehicle must return to the parking lot. Scouts will carry the rest of the gear up from the parking lot to their campsites.

Camp Policies

Participant Requirements: All Scouts, leaders and adult volunteers need to be registered with the Boy Scouts of America. This membership could be through a Boy Scout Troop, Venturing Crew, district or council level position.

Adult Leadership: The Denver Area Council requires "two-deep" adult leadership for all units. Two deep leadership is for the protection of both youth and adult participants. One adult leader must be 21 years of age or older, and the other must be 18 years of age or older, by the time the unit arrives. Per Colorado law regarding Child Care, there must be one adult for every ten youth with a minimum of two adults. Coed crews must follow Venturing requirements.

Uniforms: Campers are requested to wear full Field Uniforms to dinner and evening flag ceremonies.

Damage to Camp Equipment and Facilities: Each unit is responsible for taking care of camp equipment assigned to them and leaving the campsite better than found. The unit is responsible for all costs for repairs or replacement of damaged equipment. You and your campsite host will jointly inspect all equipment when you arrive and when you leave. Vandalism is a criminal offense and a fine will be assessed. Charges will be based on the repair or replacement costs estimated by the Camp Ranger.

Tobacco: Denver Area Council camps are a tobacco free environment. Scouters are prohibited to smoke or use chewing tobacco in the presence of Scouts and on camp property. If you do use tobacco you must go to designated area off property in accordance with Colorado State Child Care Licensing Department. **You may not use tobacco of any type including vaporizer pens on Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch property. Youth may not use tobacco at any time.**

Do Not Bring to Camp: Please leave your firearms, ammunition, archery equipment at home. Alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, marijuana or marijuana products, and fireworks are not permitted at any BSA camp. Additionally, do not bring expensive items that may be damaged due to the nature of summer camp.

Ejection from Camp: The Denver Area Council reserves the right to remove any person from BSA property for violation of camp rules, DAC policies, BSA policies or local, state and federal laws. In some cases, local law enforcement may be contacted.

Adult Leader Roster

The Camp Scoutmaster must list all adults coming to camp for the week on the Unit Adult Registration Form and turn these forms in while checking in at camp. An accurate, daily list must be completed, which identifies when adults will be arriving and departing. The Camp Scoutmaster will be responsible to update the Unit Adult Registration Form throughout the week if changes occur.

Also, during the check-in process, the Camp Scoutmaster must certify that he has seen a current Youth Protection Training certificate for all registered adult leaders listed on the Unit Adult Registration Form who will be remaining on the ranch for more than 24 hours. Adult leaders listed on the Unit Adult Registration Form who will be remaining on the ranch for more than 24 hours and do not have proof of current Youth Protection Training certification will be required to take the training online at Headquarters. Please note that any adult leader can complete youth protection training prior to their arrival by going online to www.my.scouting.org.

Adult Leader References

Due to our Colorado Child Care licensing, all adult leader must provide us a signed copy of the Leaders Reference Form found in the back of this guide. Please have this form filled out before you arrive at camp to help us keep as smooth a check in as possible.

Camp Identification

At check-in, you will be given a wristband or another form of identification for each youth and adult who arrives on Sunday. Adults who arrive later in the week must check in at the office, and will receive a form of identification at that time. For your own safety, all participants must wear the appropriate wristband identification while on camp!

Health & Safety

Youth Protection Training for Adults

All adult participants, including your volunteer parents, are required to be current in Youth Protection Training. Please bring a valid Youth Protection Training certificate to check-in. Certification is valid for 12 months, and leaders who have not been through the training will be required to take the training when they arrive at camp. This requirement is to be verified by the Camp Scoutmaster before the troop arrives at camp. You can complete Youth Protection Training online through the Online Learning Center at my.scouting.org.

Youth Protection at a Glance

- **Sleeping Arrangements:** Youth and adults must sleep in separate tents. A parent may share a tent with his/her son or daughter, but not with another youth. All youth must have at least one tent-mate for Youth Protection, safety, and security reasons.
- **Showers and Locker Rooms:** Adults over the age of 18 have the option of using the facilities in Gilwell, which is under the dining hall at Camp Cris Dobbins. If unit adults want to use the latrine facilities in their campsites or at the shelters, they must follow a shower schedule. Units must make this themselves at Camp Dobbins or Camp Dietler. Scouts may only shower in their campsite.
- **Discipline and Treatment:** Discipline to a camper will not be in the form of physical harm, fear, or intimidation. Campers will not be handled roughly, struck, or shaken. Separation will be brief and appropriate to the age and circumstance, and in a safe and comfortable place within hearing distance of an adult. Meals may not be denied as punishment.
- **Language:** Verbal abuse, discriminatory or derogatory remarks, belittling, extreme sarcasm, and off-color conversation or jokes shall not be tolerated from youth or adults.
- **Leader Conduct:** Adult leaders should avoid unnecessary or inappropriate physical contact with Scouts. Two-deep leadership is required at all times. If you feel a one-on-one meeting is needed, <u>please</u> hold it in a public setting. All leaders must be aware and follow the Youth Protection Guidelines.
- **Mandatory Child Abuse Reporting:** Any adult leader who becomes aware of actual or possible child abuse is required by Colorado law to make a report. Contact the Camp Director and/or Camp Ranger immediately if you suspect any abuse taking place. They will evaluate the situation and proceed in accordance with legal requirements and BSA policies.
- Obscrimination: Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch and the Denver Area Council, B.S.A. is an equal opportunity facility that does not discriminate on basis of age, sex, color, race, creed, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, disability, national origin or religion. All participants shall observe this code while on property.

Discrimination Policy

Anti-Harassment Policy: The Denver Area Council and Boy Scouts of America prohibit language or behavior that belittles or puts down any of its youth or adult members or non-members. This policy includes unwelcome sexual advances, racial slurs, chastisement for religious or other beliefs, or any other actions or comments that are derogatory of people. Any form of hazing, initiations, ridicule, or inappropriate teasing is prohibited. The consequence for any of these actions will result in, but not be limited to immediate removal from camp property and local law enforcement authorities will be contacted. Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch enforces a zero-tolerance policy.

Health Information

photocopy of the adult's health insurance card.
RECOMMENDED: Day visitors should provide a medical form in case of emergency.
Make a copy of all medical forms for both youth and adults. Copies cannot be made at camp, and the
Denver Area Council will keep these records for designated amounts of time per Colorado law.

Medications Checklist

- □ All youth who take medications including but not limited to prescribed medications, herbal supplements, vitamins and over-the-counter medications must have these listed on Part B of the medical form.
 - o Part B must be signed by a licensed medical practitioner under the medications list.
 - o Per Colorado law, all medications will be stored and dispensed by camp medical personnel.
 - o All medications must be in original containers, marked with the Scout's name and unit number. Only send dosages needed for the week.
 - Daily pill containers and any other containers are not allowed.
 - o Medical Marijuana is not allowed and will not be dispensed per the Guide to Safe Scouting.
- □ All youth who need to carry life-saving medications must complete the "Contract to Self-Carry". This must be signed by a parent or legal guardian.
- ☐ RECOMMENDED: The "Medication Administration Record" filled out prior to arrival.

Safety & Weather Considerations

Though safety is always emphasized at Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch, not all accidents can be avoided.

Weather: The Colorado weather will pleasantly surprise you, as most of the days are sunny with a chance of brief thunderstorms in the afternoon. The humidity is low and nights are cool and good for sleeping. Storms are common in the afternoons in the mountains and it is important to watch the skies because storms often come in quickly. Be careful to avoid being above timberline in the afternoon. Temperatures can range from a high of 80 degrees during the day to 30 degrees or cooler at night. Be prepared.

Altitude: All participants need to be aware of the additional challenges and dangers, which higher altitudes can create. At 7,000 feet, there is 30% less oxygen in the air than at sea level, and the lungs will have to work that much harder; the rise of 2,000 feet in elevation from Denver should not be underestimated. Individuals who are out of shape and/or smoke will notice a pronounced difficulty in breathing after strenuous activity. Also, at higher elevations, UV rays are stronger and exposed skin is much more susceptible to these damaging rays. Sunblock needs to be worn always. Other challenges caused by altitude include slower boil times for water, longer cook times, difficulty sleeping the first few nights, and the possibility of altitude sickness.

Mountain or altitude sickness is a condition that affects some hikers at the higher elevations (usually above 6,000 feet). Please note that Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch's altitude is approximately 7,000 feet. The most common symptom is a headache, often accompanied by nausea, dizziness and loss of coordination. Victims may also suffer slightly slurred or slowed speech, loss of appetite and insomnia. In its mild form, mountain sickness is not serious and sometimes can be alleviated with aspirin and an increased fluid intake. Descending one or two thousand feet will cause most symptoms to disappear. Please prepare your Scouts with an acclimation and hydration regiment 2-3 days before coming to camp.

Dehydration: Symptoms include nausea, light-headedness, headaches, dizziness, weakness, or muscle cramps. Suggested prevention is drinking plenty of water; at least 4 quarts throughout the day. Water stops should be scheduled, and all are encouraged to drink, even if they are not yet thirsty.

Hypothermia: Hypothermia is when the body is so cold it cannot warm itself up. As the core temperature of the body drops, vital organs begin to shut down. Symptoms range from shivering to becoming unconscious. Treat by warming the body from the inside with warm fluids to the outside with dry and warm clothing or blankets.

Conservation and Leave No Trace (LNT)

Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch strives to maintain the land we use by practicing these basic principles:

BSA Outdoor Code

As an American, I will do my best to Be clean in my outdoor manners, Be careful with fire, Be considerate in the outdoors, and Be conservation minded.

Leave No Trace

While in Base Camp, as well as in the backcountry, your unit will practice Leave No Trace principles.

- 1. Plan ahead and prepare.
- 2. Travel and camp on durable surfaces.
- 3. Dispose of waste properly.
- 4. Leave what you find.
- 5. Minimize campfire impact.
- 6. Respect Wildlife.
- 7. *Be considerate of other visitors.*

Fires at Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch: The Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch Superintendent is responsible for all fires on property. The decision of having a fire ban at camp is based on information received from the Elbert County Sheriff.



Youth Protection Policy Information



It is required that all adults attending camp have taken the Youth Protection Training.

Colorado Law and BSA policy mandates that camp staff, adult volunteers and all other members of the Boy Scouts of America are mandatory reporters of suspected child abuse and neglect. Abuse can include adult on youth and youth on youth contact.

While we do not wish or anticipate any abuse to occur at camp, in rare instances it happens. Please follow the guidelines below.

Report Abuse: Colorado law requires all Scouts and Scouters must report possible abuse situations. Inform the Camp Director and/or Camp Ranger immediately. They will proceed in accordance with legal requirements of the State of Colorado and Boy Scouts of America policies, including notifying the Scout Executive.

All Youth Protection Concerns should immediately be directed to the Denver Area Council Scout Executive by calling the Council Office at 303.455.5522.

The Denver Area Council, Boy Scouts of America operates summer camping programs that are licensed by the Colorado Department of Human Services. The license indicates that the program has met the required standards for the operation of a child day care facility. The current license and most recent inspection is available for review in the camp office at both Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch and Tahosa High Adventure Base.

Every precaution is taken to protect your child's well-being. Unfortunately, on rare occasions, an incident of abuse may occur. If you believe that your child has been abused, you should seek immediate assistance from your county department of social services. The telephone number to report child abuse in the State of Colorado is 1.844.CO.4.KIDS.

We all play a role in preventing child abuse and neglect.



- Take shelter in nearest building. Stay inside, or under cover.
- Do not walk in open areas Hikes/Cycling return to main camp area.
- Stay away from lake.

When the camp is assembled together, units should line up single file and remain silent. The unit leader will be given cards to indicate the unit's status. Hold up the white card that shows the unit's number. Along with the white card, hold up the color status card. Green indicates all members are present and accounted for, yellow indicates the unit is missing someone and red indicates that someone need immediate medical attention.

Other Emergency Procedures and Information

Lost Person

For a lost person, check their tent and surrounding campsite. Then check their last known program area or location, and the trading post. If the person cannot be found promptly, immediately notify the camp Leadership Team while continuing to search.

Carry Car Keys and a Troop Roster

When we assemble after an emergency, we will ask unit leaders to account for all those on your roster. The process will go quicker if you have a copy of roster. Adults should always carry a roster while in camp. If it becomes necessary to evacuate camp, we will rely on your drivers for transportation. You may not be able to return to the campsite. Drivers should always carry their keys.

Contacting Families in an Emergency

If your troop should have a need to contact the families of campers, we recommend you set up a "phone tree" suitable to your situation, so that a unit leader can contact one or two people back home, and they can contact families. At all times, the unit leaders should carry this information with them.

Peaceful Valley Scout Ranch Emergency Drill

On opening day of each camp program at the parent/leader meeting, the camp director will review camp emergency procedures as listed above. With respect to emergency drills, the parents/leaders will be informed that the camp will have an emergency drill at the first flag ceremony on Sunday night.



Swim Classification Procedures

The swim classification of individuals participating in a Boy Scouts of America activity is a key element in both Safe Swim Defense and Safety Afloat. The **swim classification tests should be renewed annually**, preferably at the beginning of each outdoor season. Traditionally, the swim classification test has only been conducted at a long-term summer camp. However, there is no restriction that this is the only place the test is conducted. It may be more useful to conduct the swim classification prior to a unit going to summer camp.

All persons participating in BSA aquatics are classified according to swimming ability. The classification tests and test procedures have been developed and structured to demonstrate a skill level consistent with the circumstances in which the individual will be in the water. The Swimmer's Test demonstrates the minimum level of swimming ability for recreational and instructional activity in a confined body of water with a maximum 12-foot depth and with shallow water footing or a pool or pier edge always within 25 feet of the swimmer.

The various components of each test evaluate the several skills essential to the minimum level of swimming ability. Each step of the test is important and should be followed as listed below:

SWIMMER'S TEST (Blue Swimmer): Jump feet first into water over the head in depth, level off, and begin swimming. Swim 75 yards in a strong manner using one or more of the following strokes: side stroke, breast stroke, trudgen, or crawl; then swim 25 yards using an easy resting backstroke. The 100 yards must be swum continuously and include at least one sharp turn. After completing the swim, rest by floating for 1 minute.

BEGINNER'S TEST (Red Swimmer): Jump feet first into water over the head in depth, level off, swim 25 feet on the surface, stop, turn sharply, resume swimming as before, and return to starting place.

Any Scout participating in an aquatic merit badge must be a **Blue Swimmer**. No exceptions!

Administration of Swim Classification Test

(THE COUNCIL CHOOSES ONE OF THESE OPTIONS):

If you choose option B or C please bring these records to camp or the Scouts and Scouters will have to retake the swimming test. **Appendix 1-Denver Area Council Swimming Classification Record**.

OPTION A (at camp): The swim classification test is completed the first day of camp by Camp Aquatics personnel. I would highly recommend that you complete the swimming classification test through Option B or C since the lake is a tempered 55-60 degrees (if you are lucky)

OPTION B (**Council conducted/council controlled**): The council controls the swim classification process by predetermined dates, locations and approved personnel to serve as aquatics instructors. When the unit goes to a summer camp, everyone will be issued a buddy tag under the direction of the Camp Aquatics Director for use at the camp.

OPTION C (At unit level with council-approved aquatics resource people): The swim classification test done at a unit level should be conducted by one of the following council-approved resource people: Aquatics instructor, BSA; Aquatics Supervisor; BSA Lifeguard; certified lifeguard; swimming instructor; or swim coach. When the unit goes to a summer camp, everyone will be issued a buddy tag under direction of the Camp Aquatics Director for use at the camp

SPECIAL NOTE: When swim tests are conducted away from camp or at the point of activity, the Aquatics Director shall always, reserve the authority to review or retest all participants to ensure that standards have been maintained.

Physical abuse is the injury of the child by other than accidental means. Emotional abuse is the constant belittling, criticizing, yelling at and verbal tearing down of the child. Sexual abuse is any sexual activity between a child and an adult, or sexual activity involving children in which the age, size or other power factors between the participants is unequal. Child neglect is failure to provide necessary nurturance when resources are available to do so.

Under the "Child Protection Act of 1987" (C.R.S. 19-3-301) in the Colorado Children's Code, leaders are required to report suspected child abuse or neglect. The law at 19-3-304 states that if a leader has "reasonable cause to know or suspect that a child has been subjected to abuse or neglect or who has observed the child being subjected to circumstances or conditions which would reasonably result in abuse or neglect shall immediately report" such information to the Camp Director. It is not the leader's role to investigate suspected abuse —only to report it. Persons who make a good faith report are immune from civil and criminal liability. Additionally, the law provides for the protection of the identity of the reporting party.

A leader who fails to report suspected child abuse or neglect commits a class 3 misdemeanor and will be punished as provided in section 18-1-106, C.R.S.
